

Three Challenges of Now

Imperative 1 Save Lives	Public Health	Slow and reduce the spread of Covid-19 and support our most at-risk people
Imperative 2 Save Livelihoods	Economic	Support individuals, families and businesses so they make it through the shelter in place and safely return to work
Imperative 3 Preserve our Fiscal Health	Fiscal	Ensure the continued fiscal health of the City so we can meet imperatives 1 and 2 while providing essential services

City Emergency Response: Slow and reduce the spread of COVID-19, and support our most at-risk people



Prior to COVID-19, the City was responsible for about **850** meals per day

for over 400,000 meals per day

Local Assistance Focus: Our Most Vulnerable

Residents

- Individuals/families at highest risk due to:
 - Age, illness, or caregiving
 - · Loss of employment, work hours, or loss of income
 - Lack of access to resources (immigration status or other barriers)

Small Business

- Small/ microbusiness, self-employed, sole proprietors who:
 - Lost clientele or lost income due to cancellations/closures or health safety restrictions
 - Priority to essential businesses having immediate liquidity issues

Nonprofits

- Nonprofits experiencing COVID-19 impacts:
 - Event/venue closures
 - Loss of revenue
 - · Increase in client or service needs



Assistance: What's Available?

- Free food
- Unemployment, Disability, Family Leave
- 13 additional weeks + \$600 per week (Pandemic Unemployment Assistance)
- CARES Act IRS check
- Eviction protections
- Utility shutoff protection

W2 worker

- CARES Act IRS check
- Eviction protections
- Utility shutoff protection

Contract/gig worker

- Free food
- No Unemployment Insurance
- No CARES Act IRS check
- California Relief Assistance
- Eviction protections
- ·Utility shutoff protection

Undocumented worker

- SBA Loans

- Technical assistance






