Catalog Description

This seminar will support the student teaching field experience. Students will be asked to extend their pedagogical content knowledge in light of their phase II experiences and will be supported in the preparation of their Performance Assessment for California Teachers. Prerequisites: EDSC 184X and Good standing in the Secondary Education Credential Program. Grading CR/NC. 1 unit.

Description of the Course

This seminar is designed as an opportunity for exploration and sharing of ideas, concerns, and questions that arise during your student teaching experience. You will be encouraged to reflect on your teaching experiences and to extend your perspective on teaching beyond your specific assignment. This course can also be viewed as an extension of your methods course in that we will address current beliefs about teaching and learning. Specific attention will also be given to the PACT (Performance Assessment for California Teachers).

Technology will be revisited in this seminar. Emphasis will be placed on designing lessons with appropriate uses of software and graphing calculators. Use of the internet for resources and student projects will also be addressed.

Grading

This course is graded credit/no credit. You must successfully complete all seminar requirements as well as having a passing grade from your university supervisor and mentor teacher.

Seminar Expectations

Attendance and Participation. Please attend all classes and actively participate in classroom activities.

Missed Classes. Any time you are unable to come to class due to illness, accident, or other unavoidable incident, it is your responsibility to contact me regarding the missed class as soon as you are able. Each missed class should be made up by submitting a book or article analysis and reflection (at least 2000 words) on the day of your return to class. It is your responsibility to secure the book or article that you will analyze.

Journals. You will submit some journal entries about your student teaching experiences. These will be due in the first half of the semester.

Presentation. During the semester you will give a presentation on one of the following topics:

- a. an innovative approach to a difficult topic or concept b.
- an application of a high school topic
- c. an activity or teaching approach geared towards English Language Learners
- d. a use of technology

Presentations may be done individually or in pairs.

Phase Two Expectations

- 1. You will teach two different preparations for the school's entire semester. This includes being responsible for lesson plans, grading, and classroom management. See your handbook for a list of responsibilities.
- 2. For the purpose of demonstrating competency in the use of technology, you will teach at least one lesson using technology. In this lesson, you must integrate the technology into the math unit you are teaching. This lesson must be observed by your university supervisor.
- 3. You will be on the school campus for at least four hours each day. You will need this time to meet with cooperating teachers and students. Also, use it to visit other teachers, math and non-math.
- 4. For two weeks, you will participate in the full schedule of your mentor teacher.
- 5. You will complete the PACT (Performance Assessment for California Teachers).

Course Requirements and Assignments

SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, it is expected that students will spend a minimum of forty-five hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on.
