Course Description

This course will provide an examination of Spanish culture and civilization through the centuries, beginning with the Prehistory of Spain, the years under **Celtic, Roman, Visigoth**, and **Muslim** rule, to the social and economic developments of today's Spain.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Manifest an appreciation of the diversity of contemporary Spain and understand the changing nature of culture.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of basic features of Spain's physical and political geography.
- 3. Demonstrate basic knowledge of Spain's history and its relevance in world's History
- 4. Recognize major artistic and literary works that are representative of Spanish culture.
- 5. Appreciate the customs, and modes of behavior of the people of Spain.
- 6. Develop oral skills and to encourage to use critical thinking.

Course Learning Outcomes in Detail

> Cultural Perspectives

a.Demonstrate an understanding of how all of the cultural perspectives within nations and cultures associated with the target language interact to influence the development and evolution of the target cultures (e.g., worldview, core beliefs, values).

b.Demonstrate familiarity with how the major physical and other geographical features of countries and cultures associated with the target language have influenced the cultures' development and evolution.

c.Analyze how political factors have influenced the development and evolution of cultures associated with the target language, including the interrelationship between geography and political systems.

d.Demonstrate familiarity with significant individuals, key eras, and major historical events and developments within nations and cultures associated with the target language, and analyze their influence on the development and evolution of the target cultures.

e.Demonstrate an understanding of how the political, religious, social, economic, and educational systems and institutions in nations and cultures associated with the target language have been shaped by and have influenced the development and evolution of the target cultures (e.g., traditions, social conventions, social relationships, and social status).

Cultural Practices

a.Demonstrate an understanding of how cultural practices exemplify cultural perspectives. For example:

- rituals and traditions
- social institutions such as marriage and family
- social status and social relationships
- holidays and festivals
- health practices and traditions
- patterns of work and leisure
- culinary traditions and practices

b.Analyze cultural stereotypes and their effects on the perceptions of and attitudes toward the target cultures.

Cultural Products

a.Demonstrate an understanding of how the products of a target culture exemplify cultural perspectives. For example:

- architecture
- works of art (e.g., painting, sculpture, handicrafts)
- artistic performance (e.g., music, dance, drama)
- literature
- technology and media (e.g., Web sites, advertisements)
- entertainment
- fashion
- manufactured goods

Course Requirements and Assignments

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with one of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus. (See SJSU Academic Senate Policy S12-3.)

Because this is a 4-unit course, students can expect to spend a minimum of twelve hours per week preparing for and attending classes and completing course assignments. Careful time management will be required to keep up with readings and assignments in an intensive course such as this one.

The course requirements include one exam on Geography and Today's Spain, three exams on History and Arts, one project on a cultural topic, and class assignments (brief essays, group tests, etc.).

All assignments are to be done in the classroom. These points, if lost, can be recuperated with the same percentage as the final exam as explained in the section Grading Policy.

All exams have essential questions, red questions, that must be all answered correctly in order not to fail with zero points. The instructor may allow to retake the exams that failed.

The project will have two phases

- 1. The initial research phase, that culminates with a brief written or oral individual exam
- 2. The team phase, that extends the research and culminates with an oral presentation in Zoom Web Conferencing.

The percentage assigned to each component of the class is the following:

One exam of Today's Spain, Culture and Geography			
Three exams of History and Art History (15 points each) 45%

There will be no extra credits with additional assignments. However, any lost points out of 20 points of "assignments," may be recuperated proportionally in the final exam. Thus, for instance, the final exam of a student who accrued 8 points of assignments (out of 20) will be worth up to 22 point (10 plus 12).

All exams will have special questions (sine qua non), or red questions. These are essential questions. You need to respond correctly ALL these red questions in each exam in order not fail the exam with 0 points. Students will know which questions are red in advance.

There will be a penalty of 20% of the project per natural day when submitting the course project late.

Note that "All students have the right, within a reasonable time, to know their academic scores, to review their grade-dependent work, and to be provided with explanations for the determination of their course grades." The are two course projects. Project 1 is an interview to a Spaniard in person or via Zoom. This will require meetings outside of class with other students. Project 2 is a research assigned by the instructor. It may be either searching for academic sources to analyze a certain premise or prepare a presentation on a historical or cultural topic (e.g. *El flamenco, Sefarat, La movida, La San José española, Zarzuela versus opera, Presupuesto de un viaje a Galicia*). Details on the two projects will be provided during in the semester.

Classroom Protocol

The basic classroom protocol includes:

1. You are expected to treat faculty and other students with RESPECT. Do not disrupt class by leaving and reentering during class or using mobile phone. Do not distract us by chatting. Be attentive to comments made by the instructor and by your peers. Do not sleep, do not use electronic devices, do not study for another course, etc. Students who violate these minimal expectations will be asked to leave.

2. You are expected to PREPARE THE CLASSES (the corresponding readings and watching videos) according to the schedule included in the last page of this syllabus.

3. ELECTRONIC DEVICES: All personal electronic devices, including cellular telephones, laptop, computers, personal music players, etc., are to be turned off and stored during class.
